Research: My research interests focus on the interactions between textiles and cutaneous health, exploring how fabric properties influence skin physiology, protection, and overall dermatologic outcomes.

As an aside, I vividly remember seeing the framed patent on Dr. Heymann's wall—if I recall correctly, it was for topical thyroid hormone. I was so impressed and inspired by it that I carried that memory with me for years. I'm proud to say that as of this week, after years of research, I received my first patent for UV protection in textiles, based on construction without the use of sunscreen finishes. It's a moment of immense pride and a tribute to the inspiration I drew from my training.

#### What is your fondest memory of Cooper Dermatology?

My fondest memories of Cooper Dermatology are from the resident clinics and, believe it or not, inpatient call! During my training, these clinics offered a unique opportunity for continuity of care over three straight years of training, allowing me to learn how to develop strong, ongoing relationships with patients and a deeper understanding of providing outpatient care. Unlike many programs where rotations last only weeks or months, we had the privilege of seeing the full spectrum of the patient experience and dermatologic disease, from initial visits to long-term outcomes. This immersive experience not only deepened my clinical knowledge but also gave me the confidence to enter practice seamlessly the day after completing my residency. It was an invaluable foundation for my career in dermatology and allowed me to build and grow my private practice rapidly.

#### Words of advice to current dermatology residents?

Recognize how fortunate you are to train in a program with such highly skilled, knowledgeable, and well-regarded faculty who genuinely care about your education and success. Take full advantage of their expertise and dedication—not only are they committed to offering the best possible patient care, but they are also deeply invested in shaping you into confident and capable dermatologists. Be open to learning, ask questions, and make the most of every opportunity to grow under their guidance. This is a truly unique and invaluable time in your career.

#### Words of advice to recent dermatology graduates?

If you're inclined to consider starting your own practice, don't shy away from it—it can be a truly rewarding path. Establishing a practice gives you the opportunity to provide care in the manner you believe is best, while also building your own name and reputation in the field. With careful planning and a strong commitment to your vision, you can create a practice that reflects your values and delivers exceptional care to your patients. Trust in your training and take the leap if it feels right for you.

#### Favorite clinical pearl:

Dr. Heymann shared numerous pearls however the one that I use every single day is this: If you can answer these four questions for patients—what's the diagnosis, is it contagious, is it a sign of something worrisome, and can you treat or manage it—you will provide them with immense comfort and ease. Simply assigning a name to their condition can bring relief, as it shifts the experience from something unknown to something understood. Patients then want reassurance that it won't harm them or their loved ones, and knowing there's a treatment or management plan is an added bonus. This approach has held true throughout my career, and every explanation I give for a dermatologic diagnosis incorporates these points. It makes a world of difference within seconds with every patient encounter.

Attend regional or national meetings even if it feels like you don't have the time—the energy and connections that you get from conferences as a young attending are invaluable.

**Favorite clinical pearl:** When you're seeing a patient, introduce yourself to everyone in the room; it demonstrates that you're interested in the patient and who they brought with them, and it shows confidence.

Why did you choose dermatology or Mohs Fellowship? I initially went into medicine with a desire to pursue medical missions work. I was drawn to the field of surgery and when I was introduced to Mohs surgery, I knew I had found my niche and ultimately pursued a fellowship in Mohs surgery. I feel incredibly blessed to have received training and board certification in dermatology with a specific focus on skin cancer detection and treatment while serving in the Navy in austere locations. I was stationed in Guam for close to 3 years, Bahrain for 2 years, and deployed on the USNS Comfort hospital ship to Guatemala, Honduras, Colombia, and the Dominican Republic where my team and I provided skin cancer related care. Many of my patients are outdoor enthusiasts, which leads to fun interactions while providing the treatment they require. I am very grateful for this fellowship year with Dr. Lawrence and look forward to providing Mohs surgery in Wolfeboro, New Hampshire just outside the White Mountains after completion of Mohs fellowship in June 2025.

Favorite clinical pearl: An alcohol pad can serve you well when diagnosing skin cancer and detecting its borders.

What will you take away from your fellowship training here? Learning from Dr. Lawrence and benefiting from her years of experience has been amazing. She is truly an expert in reconstruction, especially nasal reconstruction, and my flap differential continues to be sharpened and honed; she literally has broken down each flap into steps leading to optimal results. As a result of this fellowship, my ability to select the best flap for each defect and research skills have been notably strengthened. I will be practicing in a rural setting and need this knowledge to perform high quality advanced reconstruction. Dr. Lawrence has also involved me in the DermSurgery Digest Podcast, which is a fabulous resource.

Words of advice to current dermatology residents? Don't be afraid to go after what brings you passion. Patients can see when you love what you do a mile away and will in turn benefit greatly. Inspire your team; everyone is good at something; find out each team member's unique skill or strength and encourage them to use this.

I'm sure you all remember the significance and challenges of being on call for inpatient consults as a resident. The excitement of diagnosing a rare condition and the satisfaction of seeing a patient improve over days exist right along-side with the heart-sinking feeling of a page in the middle of the night and the frustration of missed questions on rounds. But high-acuity, high-volume inpatient consult services prepare dermatology residents to provide excellent care for all patients, in and out of the hospital.

Although it is critically important to patient care, many hospitals do not have access to inpatient dermatology consults. Cooper is the only hospital in South Jersey with inpatient dermatology, and we receive transfers from all over the region for our specialized care. From 2022 through 2024, our residents and faculty saw 1,893 emergency room and hospital consults. With only 4 residents, that's a lot of pages!

One way we thank our residents for all their work is by supporting them to attend conferences. This winter our second-year residents will attend the Dermatology Foundation meeting, and our upper-year residents will attend the AAD meeting, thanks in part to your donations to the Cooper Foundation.
