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A word from the Program Director Dr. Lacy Sommer

Spring is here, and with that comes fresh starts and new beginnings. For senior medical students, this culminates on one fateful day in March: **Match Day**. I'm sure you all remember the myriad of emotions you experienced while waiting to open a letter (and now an email) to find out the next step in your career. Pure joy and elation to have matched at your #1 program? Trepidation to have matched but in a program across the country from your family or loved ones? Or utter heartbreak to have not matched at all. Given the continued competitiveness of our specialty, all of these emotions will be experienced on Match Day.

The 2025 Main Residency Match remained as competitive as ever. Each year is "recordbreaking" and this year was no different. The largest Match in its 73-year history, 47,208 active applicants applied for 43,237 positions.¹ There were 148 Dermatology programs offering 524 PGY-2 positions, with only one position going unfilled. Over the last 5 years, the number of Dermatology PGY-2 positions has remained steady, with an increase just under 10%. Of the 524 available Dermatology PGY-2 positions, 80.9% went to U.S. MD Seniors (match rate of 62.7%), 6.9% to U.S. DO Seniors (match rate of 34.3%), 0.4% to U.S. International Medical Graduates (IMG) (match rate of 11.1%), and 1.9% to Non-U.S. IMG (match rate of 38.5%). The remaining 8.8% of positions went to MD Graduate applicants (i.e. graduated from medical school prior to the year of the Match, including reapplicants). ²

You should be proud to know that the quality of applicants to our program is astounding. Program Signaling has been a welcomed addition to gauge for genuine interest in our program. Of the applicants we interviewed this year, we are thrilled to have matched **Christopher Farkouh** and **Carissa Walkosak** (see page 4). Both Chris and Carissa have impressive accomplishments already, and we are excited by their enthusiasm and potential to continue your legacy of Cooper Dermatology. We wish them congratulations on graduation and a successful

intern year before welcoming them in July 2026.

SAFE SKIN INITIATIVE

Clinical interests or scope of practice: General dermatology, Erythropoietic Protoporphyria, International Dermatology

What is your fondest memory of Cooper Dermatology? I'm not sure I would pinpoint a single memory but more an aspect. That aspect by far is the people I was able to work with. My co-residents and attendings are amazing people. Whether it was Dr. Green using his young daughter's umbrella, Dr. Manders shaking his head 'no' when asking if somebody wanted a full skin exam or Dr. Heyman using a woman's walker chair to sit in while counseling her..There were always moments of laughter and fun.

Words of advice to current dermatology residents and recent graduates? When I joined my current practice, one of the founding partners told me "never forget to save time for the people you love." It applies to residency, the beginning of your career, the middle, and deciding when to retire.

Favorite clinical pearl: I'm not sure I have any clinical pearls. So Not too long ago I had a patient come in for a pyogenic granuloma on the face and she was a young teenager. I was desperate to do anything except cut it out and cauterize. I found an article that discussed two weeks of table salt application, and gave it a try. Sure, enough the thing melted away.

Safe Skin Initiative: I recently formed the Safe Skin Initiative, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit dedicated to transforming skin health standards in Burundi. When we went to Burundi to adopt my son, we just so happened to have dinner with the Ambassador from the United States and founder of a nonprofit who runs health clinics in Burundi. They asked for help with dermatology consults as they didn't have any resources in the country - literally at the time they didn't have any Dermatologists. For several years, I did telehealth consults for a couple of organizations in Burundi. I was trying to find a way to formalize the consult services when I met a doctor at the AAD last year that had been trained in Rwanda and had gone through the Gloderm mentorship program. We had a long discussion and came up with a plan to begin a consultation service throughout Burundi and do clinics for albinism. Unfortunately, in Burundi people are killed who have albinism. There are some who still have superstitions and mythical beliefs about it in that area of the world. The first clinic we did for albinism had about 50 to 100 people. The last time they had any instruction on albinism had been 20 years previous when they were given Vaseline (seriously?!?!) to protect their skin. We had received a grant from CeraVe with sunscreen that we were able to provide. Education sessions were held while a couple of surgeons did excisions on skin cancers all day for 2 days. So far, we've been able to do the clinics in about half of the country but the initial grant money ran out. We founded the nonprofit to fund the work we have started and hopefully get donations for sustainable sun protection like clothing with UPF.

Particularly for inflammatory conditions, clinical photographs and additional history can prove invaluable for arriving at a correct diagnosis.


Favorite clinical pearl:

Always remember clinicopathologic correlation - what you see on the patient must correlate with the pathologic findings. Some of my favorite examples are: "string of pearls" of clear cell acanthoma correlate to the dilated vessels in dermal papillae and "yellow dots" of alopecia areata correlate to dilated follicular infundibula.

Erika is one of our current PGY-3 residents interested in pursuing a Mohs fellowship.




